Jewish Museum opens in Oslo

HRH Crown Prince Haakon officially opened the new Jewish Museum in Oslo on Monday, September 8. In his talk the Crown Prince said, "Congratulations on this day! With the opening of the Jewish Museum an important circle is closed, with the Holocaust Center and the memorial at Akershus. By sharing our histories and understanding what we together have been and are a part of, we become closer." He emphasized how vital it is that we be familiar with history and how important the equality of all people is as a basic principle.

The new museum was actually established on January 7, 2004 through the cooperative efforts of the Jewish Congregation in Oslo and Oslo City Museum, but only recently had its own building. The museum is now located at Calmeyers Street 15B in a building that served as a Jewish synagogue from 1921 until it was closed by the Nazis during the autumn of 1942. At that time there were Jews living in the building, and when the Nazis came along these Jews were sent to death camps.

The synagogue was built in what was once the heart of the Jewish community in Oslo. Many of the Jewish immigrants who came to Norway beginning in the mid-nineteenth century settled in this part of the city as well as in Grünerløkka.

According to historian Bjarte Bruland, there were four Jewish congregations meeting in Oslo at the beginning of the twentieth century. By 1917, when the number of Jews in and around Oslo was just under 1300, there were only two congregations (Det Mosaiske Trossamfunn and Den Israelittiske Menighet). The years 1920 and 1921 saw the construction of two new synagogues from the ground up. The first, erected by the Jewish Congregation in Oslo in 1920, was reopened after Jewish survivors returned to Norway in 1945. This synagogue is located at Bergstien 13 and is today the home of an active congregation. The other, in Calmeyers Street, was never reopened. After the Holocaust there were hardly enough Jews remaining in the city to support one synagogue, let alone two.

The synagogue in Calmeyers Street was used as a house of worship for only 21 years, but the building itself survived Nazi vandalism. Since 1942, the building has had many uses. Now, at last, part of the building is home to the Jewish Museum. Care has been taken to uncover and restore traces of the old synagogue which was so important to the Jewish community in pre-war Oslo.

The museum, which opened its doors to the public on September 16, presents the history of the Jews in Norway from the mid-nineteenth century to the present time and seeks to answer such questions as, "Where did the Jewish immigrants come from?", "How did they settle and live their lives in a non-Jewish, Norwegian environment?" and "What is Jewish life in Norway like today?" In addition to a permanent exhibit, the museum will display temporary exhibits and serve as the venue for cultural programs and activities.

The opening exhibit was in two parts. One focused on Jewish art and culture, and the other on Jewish contributions to Norway's cause and the resistance movement during World War II. The exhibit was titled, "Freedom is won not only once," and thirteen highly accomplished Norwegian Jews were portrayed in the exhibit.

In the view of Chief Rabbi Michael Melchior, one important contribution of the museum will be to inform Norwegians of the role played by Norwegian Jews in the resistance movement and in the military. No fewer than one hundred and forty Jews served in the Norwegian armed forces at that time. "This is unknown to most," said Melchior. "It is important to tell people that such a disproportionately large segment of such a small minority participated in this way."

Farewell to a Famous Landmark

Between 600 and 700 people gathered at Holmenkollen on October 16 to witness the start of work to take down the famous Holmenkollen Ski Jump, one of the main tourist attractions in Norway. But this is not the end. A new and better ski jump will be erected on the site and will be completed in time for the World Ski Championships to be held in Oslo in 2011.

The first ski competition was held at Holmenkollen in 1892. The present ski jump has been rebuilt 18 times.

There have been requests for the glogg recipe we have served at the Julebord the last several years:

Cranberry Glogg

(If desired, use cranberry liqueur in place of the cranberry juice, eliminate the sugar, and substitute red wine for white wine.)

- 1 (28 ounce) bottle white table wine, or 4 cups white grape juice (which we use at the lodge)
- 4 cups cranberry juice
- 8 whole cloves
- 1 piece fresh ginger, about 1 inch square, peeled
- 2 (3 inch) cinnamon sticks
- 1/4 to 1/2 cup sugar

The night before you plan to serve this glogg, combine the wine (or grape juice), cranberry juice, cloves, ginger, and cinnamon sticks. Before serving, stir in the sugar to taste and heat to serving temperature, 150-170 degrees Fahrenheit, just below simmering. Ladle into small, warmed glogg cups or demitasse.

(We heat it first and then sweeten to taste, as the spices get stronger after heating.)

10 servings, 6 ounces each
